Hartford Hospital, with a national reputation for excellence and innovation, is one of the largest and most sophisticated tertiary medical centers in the country. It has been training physicians and other healthcare providers since its founding in 1854. The hub of a statewide network of services known as Hartford Healthcare Corporation, Hartford Hospital boasts among its divisions: VNA Healthcare, Inc., Clinical Laboratory Partners, Natchaug Hospital, Rushford Center, Eastern Rehabilitation Network, MidState Medical Center, Jefferson House (a 104-bed long-term care facility), and The Institute of Living, a 150-bed mental health center that was founded in 1822 as the first hospital of any kind in Connecticut. Hartford Hospital's active medical staff comprises over 900 physicians and dentists within 17 departments. It operates the state's only air ambulance system, Life Star.

SERVING OUR COMMUNITY'S NEEDS

For over 150 years Hartford Hospital has played the role of an active and concerned corporate citizen in the city for which it is named. Although providing quality healthcare to all in need is the hospital's primary contribution, its responsibility to its neighbors goes well beyond safeguarding their health. Under the watchful eye of volunteer board members who represent the community, Hartford Hospital anchors its quadrant of the city. The hospital sends healthcare information, screenings and services into the community to help those with limited access to healthcare; it employs city residents; it contributes to the beautification of homes and streets in its neighborhood, and it partners with a myriad of local organizations with missions compatible with its own. The hospital is justifiably proud of the work it has done to improve life in the South End, and see the well-being of both Hartford and Hartford Hospital as forever entwined.

Some of our major initiatives:

- Hartford Hospital provided the leadership, secured the support, and now operates a mobile mammography van that is taking mammography services to local churches, businesses, schools, community organizations, and other sites. Directed particularly at the underserved segments of the greater Hartford area, "Take the Time" mobile mammography helps to address issues of uneven healthcare access that may be facilitating a disproportionate breast cancer mortality rate among minorities.
- As the "Center of Excellence" for the Northern Tier in Connecticut, Hartford Hospital contributes to the state's anti-terrorism activities, participating in drills, offering training and guidance to other healthcare providers and working closely with the Department of Public Health to ensure a coordinated and professional response to terrorism threats.

- c) Hartford Hospital is one of 13 National Cancer Institute “Community Cancer Center Programs” – NCCCP – facilities nationwide, bringing quality cancer care and access to leading edge research to underserved populations.
- d) Hartford Hospital operates a community health education bus known as Healthstar, which visits neighborhood schools, churches, health fairs, senior centers, homeless shelters, and major statewide and local events delivering health education information on such topics as wellness, fitness, chronic diseases, domestic violence, and healthy lifestyles, to name a few. Healthstar also transports volunteer staff who conduct health screenings to detect high cholesterol, high blood pressure, diabetes, and weight and dietary concerns.
- e) To ensure rapid treatment for people in need of emergency care throughout the state and beyond, Hartford Hospital operates LIFESTAR, the state’s only air ambulance system.
- f) Historically, during the flu season in the fall, Hartford Hospital answers a request from the Hartford Health Department to conduct a city-wide influenza and pneumonia vaccine campaign. The Hospital transports nurses and support staff volunteers to 20-30 senior centers and homeless shelters all around the city of Hartford over a two-week period to immunize nearly 2,000 high risk individuals.
- g) Hartford Hospital has created a fully bilingual, bicultural primary care ambulatory program to better address the health needs of the Latino populations in the community, and developed a teaching and treatment Asthma Community Education program reaching into the homes of asthma sufferers.
- h) As a Southside Institutions Neighborhood Alliance (SINA) partner, Hartford Hospital has contributed substantial resources to the creation of the Learning Corridor. In addition, through SINA the hospital has been involved in job skills training, housing initiatives, neighborhood beautification projects and the ongoing economic development of the South End.
- i) To better serve the wider community, Hartford Hospital now has satellite facilities in Windsor, Wethersfield, Glastonbury, Avon, and Blue Back Square in West Hartford, and has a new cancer center in Avon.
