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Connecticut's Hospitals Gather to Address Emergency Preparedness CHA, DPH Sponsor Conference on Planning for a Public Health Crisis

Wallingford, CT — Planning for a catastrophic healthcare crisis was the focus today for clinical, administrative, and operational healthcare leaders from throughout Connecticut attending *Emergency Preparedness – Standards of Care During Prolonged Health Emergencies*. In collaboration with the Department of Public Health (DPH), the full-day program featured state and national experts in healthcare disaster planning.

Among the nationally recognized experts addressing the gathering were Stephen Cantrill, MD, Denver Health Medical Center, speaking on *Disaster Alternate Care Facilities: The Old, The New, and The Difficult* and Dan Hanfling, MD, Director of Emergency Management and Disaster Medicine, Inova Health System, Falls Church, VA, presenting *Crisis Standards of Care: A Review of the IOM Report (and Reflection from Haiti)*. Dr. Hanfling's September 2009 publication, "Guidance for Establishing Standards of Care," outlined those patients who should receive the limited resources available in a crisis, who decides this, and when these standards of care should be adopted.

Kathryn Brinsfield, MD, Medical Director for the United States Department of Homeland Security, addressed *Disasters, Resources, and Standards of Care*. Dr. Brinsfield discussed creating a standard of care matrix that is right for each individual organization, building on work that has already been done. She emphasized the importance of creating awareness, and implementing and communicating the best ways to move resources in a time of crisis.

Representatives from the Department of Public Health led a discussion on a <u>draft white paper</u>, "Standards of Care: Providing Healthcare During a Prolonged Public Health Emergency," to provide crisis planning guidance for healthcare facilities and providers.
